
Background – Current Well-being Frameworks & Measurement

- Efforts to measure well-being and related concepts are widespread
- •Complex, multi-faceted concepts with objective and subjective components, various levels of measurement, context-specific
- Multiple overlapping international frameworks employed
- •Large variation in national efforts to measure, inform policy
 - O Shared global recognition of the need to go 'beyond GDP'
 - O Many diverse efforts and resources no 'one size fits all'



A New Health Promotion Centered Well-being Measurement Framework

- •To promote the creation of **well-being societies** through the generation and use of data, considering the current context of well-being measurement:
 - Currently no consensus on WB definition, measurement, or integration in government action at national level
 - Currently many WB-related concepts are also measured at the national level with little harmonization - relevant aspects could be drawn into WB framework, creating efficiencies
 - Existing frameworks focus on individual indicators, new framework can consolidate and accelerate ongoing work to move towards societal level indicators
 - Standardized, globally applied framework can facilitate benchmarking over time and at national and sub-national levels



A possible key aspect is:

We are interested in (measuring) **conditions** that can favour well-being at all the different levels



Structured Literature Review of National and International Reports



All countries in the world were investigated looking for official reports focused on well-being.

The primary international institutions have been investigated, moreover some reports from institutions with a strong focus on well-being have been coded with a total of 43 documents.



Well-being definition

- In most cases well-being definition is not discussed or quoted but given for granted.
- If this reinforce the idea of well-being as overarching concept, on the other hand it could lead to weaknesses, misunderstanding or fuzzy borders
- Comparing the different definitions of well-being (where given)...
 - Existence of well-being on different levels (individual, community, societal) acknowledged by some but not all reports
 - Well-being definitions explicitly state role in decision making and administration/government in some reports, often on well-being economy
 - Several well-being definitions acknowledge economic, social, and ecological dimensions; others define more context specific dimensions
 - · Very few reports explicitly note that both subjective and objective well-being measures can be used
 - · Several but not all reports mention importance of equality and sustainability
